Teacher's notes to accompany *The War of the Worlds* worksheet The Macmillan Magazine Online – Autumn 2010

- 1. Explain to the students that you are going to talk about something that happened on this day in history.
- 2. Dictate the first paragraph to the students, omitting the title.
 - Check the dictation together. Focus on the meaning of the paragraph and ask if anyone can suggest WHY people believed Martians were invading the world.
- 3. Having listened to the students suggestions, tell them that you are going to tell them exactly what happened. Read the final two paragraphs (below the script from the radio broadcast) out loud to them.

Ask the students to compare, in small groups, what they understood. Then get them to tell you what they understood. Read the text out loud again if necessary.

NOW GIVE THE STUDENTS THE WORKSHEET

Let the students read the text for themselves to check that they understood correctly.

4. Focus the pupils on the section of the radio script.

Complete the vocabulary task. ... Check together.

Allow students to perform or record the script if they want to.

5. If your students like to debate issues, you might like to discuss the following questions:

Could the same sort of hysterical reaction happen today? Why? Why not?

The last line speaks about the powerful influence of radio in 1938. Is the radio as influential today? Why? Why not?

- 6. Organise the quiz appropriately for your teaching context. This might be allowing the students to find the answers on the Internet, or by simply putting the students into to teams to write down their answers. ... Go through the answers together.
- 7. Complete the first sentence of the grammar task on the board. Revise the basics of passive forms if necessary. Give the students time to complete the rest of the task. ... Check together.
- 8. Students complete the dialogue. ... Check together.
- 9. Students act out the dialogue in pairs. Ask volunteers to perform in front of the class.
- 10. Students rewrite the dialogue based on a different film of their choice. Ask volunteers to perform in front of the class.
